

About Us

OPIRG-Carleton is a campus-based not-for-profit organization that works to create and sustain student and community-based engagement through research, education, and action on social justice and environmental issues.



OPIRG-Carleton was founded in 1980 after a lecture at Carleton by consumer advocate Ralph Nader. The following year the majority of students voted in a referendum in favour of placing a small levy on their student fees to support OPIRG.

In 1991, Carleton students again voted in support of OPIRG, agreeing to raise the amount of the levy to \$6.30 for full-time students and \$2.10/credit for part-time undergraduates and \$1.26 for part-time graduates.



In 2009, students voted yet again in favour of OPIRG and other campus groups to set the levy fee according to the consumer price index.

Graduate students voted to increase their fees to OPIRG-Carleton in 2010. The 2011-2012 full-time per semester levies were \$3.32 for full-time undergrads and \$3.34 for full-time grad students.

With this levy, all students at Carleton University are members of OPIRG. While the fee is classified as non-refundable, OPIRG-Carleton continues to offer refunds to students who object to the organization.

Over the years, OPIRG-Carleton has provided students a dynamic place to apply their knowledge, passions and energy to address issues of public concern, while benefiting from training, support, and real opportunities that build leadership skills and empower students to become active.

Year in Brief - Organizational Developments

In 2013-2014 OPIRG Carleton continued its commitment to research, education and action on social justice, environment and economic issues.

The year featured regular programming such as radical frosh, regular information fairs in the atrium and colloquium speakers.

The organization continued to offer space and resources to student and community groups.

Both permanent coordinators, Andy and Angela, welcomed new members to their families and took parental leaves. Yafa and Emma continued their excellent work contributing to the thriving hub that is OPIRG-Carleton. They will be missed and are remembered fondly for their skills, organizing abilities and general awesomeness.

The organization faced a challenge when its fees were not released by CUSA but after seeking assistance from a lawyer the situation was quickly remedied. It also provided OPIRG-Carleton a chance to highlight its excellent fiscal practices.


EVENTS, SPEAKERS, and PROGRAMMING

OPIRG PROJECTS

OPIRG-Carleton has a number of ongoing campus and community-oriented resources and services (Bursaries such as Terry Cottam Research, Radical Frosh, Free Store, Equipment loans, organizing and meeting space, supplies, and support to network and organize), student-led initiatives (eg. Working Groups, OPIRG Roots radio show; historically: Oxbow Park naturalization project, recycling, Garden Spot, anti-racism, etc.), educational initiatives (Colloquium Speaker Series, Tools for Change Workshop Series, Training, Resource Centre) and organizes and supports events on campus and in the community.

OPIRG BURSARIES

OPIRG-Carleton offered three bursaries in 2013-2014. The Terry Cottam Research Bursary, Undergraduate Research Bursary and Graduate Student Research Bursary provide \$500 each to a student whose research project falls within OPIRG's mandate of working on environmental, economic, or social justice issues. The bursaries were awarded in late March 2014.



ANNUAL PROGRAMMING

The OPIRG board and staff ensure annual programming rooted in OPIRG's mandate for research, education and action on social, environment and economic justice issues happens each year. To this end, there is an organizational commitment to providing core annual programming including the events described below.

About Sunny Drake // Educator// Facilitator// Theatre Artist// Workshop Facilitator and Educator:


Performance & theatre // 36 years in the making, queer & trans theatre maker & educator Sunny Drake is a complex piece of art. He lives his creative escapades, is usually in the middle of an art in life experiment.

Sunny is largely self-taught and has created his own unique style of multigenre theatre, which he has been evolving since he was a teenage girl. Sunny has performed in theatres, festivals, living-rooms, streets, work places, deserts, schools, universities, basements, backyards & conferences in Australia, the USA & Canada. Sunny has performed in numerous festivals including the San Francisco International Arts Festival (2010), the USA National Queer Arts Festival (2008/10/12), NACL Festival (New York 2010), Mardi Gras (Sydney 2009/10), Gasworks Arts Park (Melbourne 2009/10),

Brisbane Festival's UNDER THE RADAR (2009), Feast (Adelaide 2009/10), Metro Arts Independents (2012),

Pride Toronto (2013) and SummerWorks (2013).

Sunny has facilitated over 280 workshops in the past 15 years including LGBTIQ training, creative workshops, practical political workshops, community engagement, professional development for project workers & artists. Participants have included people of diverse age, gender, cultural, sexuality, disability and class backgrounds; educational institutions (universities, high schools...), artists, young people, collectives, service providers & government in both urban & rural contexts.



OPIRG Carleton proudly hosted acclaimed spoken word poet ANDREA GIBSON in March 2014 for the winter colloquium. The event was cosponsored by CUSA Gender and Sexuality Resource Centre, and Carleton University Art Gallery.

About Andrea Gibson:

Andrea Gibson is not gentle with her truths. It is this raw fearlessness that has led her to the forefront of the spoken word movement – the first winner of the Women's World Poetry Slam – Gibson has headlined prestigious performance venues coast to coast with powerful readings on war, class, gender, bullying, white privilege, sexuality, love, and spirituality.

Her work has been featured on the BBC, Air America, C-SPAN, Free Speech TV and in 2010 was read by a state representative in lieu of morning prayer at the Utah State Legislature.

Now, on her fifth full-length album FLOWER BOY and her second book THE MADNESS VASE, Gibson's poems continue to be a rally cry for action and a welcome mat at the door of the heart's most compassionate room.



The event was mainly geared toward Black people people of colour who choose not to chemically alter their hair patterns. Movie Screening and Fund Raiser for the Algonquins of Barriere Lake

On April 22 2014 the Indigenous Peoples Solidarity Movement Ottawa with Diffusion Multi-Monde screened Honour Your Word. The documentary provided an intimate portrait of life behind the barricades for the Algonquins of Barriere Lake, an inspiring First Nation whose dignity and courage contrast sharply with the political injustice they face.

Barriere Lake community members including Norm Matchewan and Elder Michel Thusky, and filmmaker Martha Stiegman (via Skype) partook in the evening. OPIRG-Carleton joined Mining Watch Canada and OPIRG Ottawa in cosponsoring the event.

Solidarity Against Austerity - May Day Mobilization

Solidarity Against Austerity (SAA) is a broad-based coalition of students, workers, environmental, anti-poverty and anti-war activists based in Ottawa. The group held a general assembly around the time of May Day. OPIRG Carleton cosponsored the events, providing \$250.00.

The group advanced four demands for May Day 2014 including:

- ✓ Saving the Postal Service (and door to door mail delivery);
- ✓ Opposing the Energy East pipeline;
- ✓ Fighting for a \$14 minimum wage; and,
- √ Free post-secondary education

Mathere Radio Project

Mathare Radio was created to provide ongoing information to and about Kenya's Mathare region. Mathare is the name of a valley and a township located just outside the centre of Kenya's capital, Nairobi. It is what the media, government, churches, non-governmental organizations and residents themselves often refer

to as a slum. Mathare Radio spotlights Mathare's hidden challenges and broaden local and international understandings of the socio-economic and political issues that impact our lives and those of the oppressed worldwide. Resisting Carceral NationStates: The Fiftenth International Conference on Penal Abolition- June 13th-15th 2014

Carceral nation states across the world know no bounds as they work to sustain economic, gender, sexual and racial inequality. In the Canadian context, the carceral nation state has used exclusionary practices in a stated effort to keep 'us' safe from 'them' – the 'criminals', Indigenous peoples 'in need of civilizing' and 'assimilation', 'problem' drug users, 'bogus' refugee claimants, 'threats' to national security, political 'dissidents', and other dehumanized and demonized populations.

People currently or formerly imprisoned, victims of state and personal harm, activists, advocates, artists, academics, journalists, professionals, along with others from around the world came together for ICOPA 15 on Algonquin Territory at the University of Ottawa. During this international conference participants: 1) shared their first-hand experiences of state brutality and tactics of resistance; 2) exchanged ideas on how to think about and respond to complex community issues that are often met with costly, unproductive, unjust, and violent interventions; and 3) built international alliances and developed strategies to struggle against state repression and work towards peace and social justice in our world.

The conference featured art, film, music, photography, plays, poetry, short stories, spiritual and healing activities, essays, papers, reports, workshops,

debates on proposals for ICOPA policy positions and resolutions, and everything in between.

OPIRG-Carleton co-sponsored ICOPA in the amount of \$500.

A note on IPSMO...

While in 2013 IPSMO didn't renew its working group status for the 2013-2014 academic year due to strained capacity at the time of renewal, the



group remained active and connected to the OPIRG-Carleton community. Members of the Indigenous Peoples Solidarity Movement—Ottawa (IPSMO) gave several workshops on Indigenous Solidarity for Settlers. These workshops engaged participants to recognize their status (and responsibilities) as settlers, and the illegitimacy of the Canadian state so long as it refuses to recognize indigenous sovereignty. At the Peoples Social Forum in August, IPSMO was an anchor group for the Indigenous Solidarity Assembly. Speakers included Clifton Nicholas, Lynn Gehl, activists from the Unist'ot'en Camp, and Algonquin land defenders. IPSMO held its annual 'Celebrating the Defense of Mother Earth' event on April 22. A fundraiser for the Algonquins of Barriere Lake, it featured speakers from the community and a screening of 'Honour Your Word', a documentary about the community. On June 19, IPSMO's community event 'Indigenous Resistance and Solidarity: Against Pipelines, For The Land' included a screening of 'RESIST: The Unist'ot'en's Call To The Land' and other short films on land

defense and allyship. On May 28, in solidarity with Idle No More, IPSMO hosted a 'Decolonize & Anti Oppression Workshop' facilitated by Tami Starlight. In October, IPMSO helped to organize 'Decolonizing Together: an Indigenous Walking Tour, Solidarity Assembly & Asinabka Festival Film Screening'. In recent months IPSMO has also worked to raise awareness of Grandfather William Commanda's vision for the Sacred Chaudière Site, which has been re-zoned by the City of Ottawa to allow condominium/commercial development on the island.

CAMPUS UNITED

A group comprised of representatives groups that make up the university, from workers, to students, to organizations and unions. This group meets as needed to address campus wide issues such as contract negotiations, tuition fees, campus safety, and the Carleton Administration.

OPIRG PROVINCIAL

Working Group Descriptions and Highlights

Access to Information

In recent years, ATI has published several academic and media publications resulting from ATI/FOI requests. These publications have appeared in Policing and Society, Security Dialogue, Current Sociology, Punishment and Society, Social Movement Studies, Canadian Journal of Crime and Criminal Justice, The Dominion, The Leveller. News coverage of our research has been aired on CBC's As It Happens, the Globe and Mail, CTV, and APTN.



Our publications have focussed on Canadian security and policing institutions and their suppression of domestic social movements –

most recently surrounding the "Green Scare." Our recent work has revealed the nature of the Canadian security apparatus targeting environmental activists, featured in the Globe and Mail: "Environmental extremism a rising threat to energy sector, RCMP warn" and in the Vancouver Observer: "Canada more at risk from environmentalists than religiously inspired terrorists: RCMP." Over the past year we have been working on a couple of big projects that will change the course of history.

Books to Prisoners



Books 2 Prisoners

The Books to Prisoners Project was initiated by OPIRG-Carleton members who were inspired by the prison activism of other PIRGs, especially those in Montreal. Our aim is to use Ottawa community resources - namely, books - and deliver the donations to prisoners who have requested reading materials. This project ties together research regarding prison regulations, programming, and accessibility; education of the public about these conditions; and action, in the form of getting books to the prisoners. It is a great way to get involved in Ottawa's activist community.

Highlights

Books 2 Prisoners Ottawa was unsuccessful -again again- at smashing down and chewing up the industrial prison complex that seems to plague us. We are like a Cold War, that is neither cold, nor a war, but more closely associated with the common cold: biting, annoying, working hard to keep those fragile bodies in the bureaucracy at CSC from performing their violent day to day functions. We held our annual book sale and a book launch for David Gilbert's *Love and Struggle*. We used the money to send books to friends, some we know and some we've never met, held captive on the inside.

REMEMBER FRIENDS: The only vehicle for prison reform...a bulldozer.

B2P has spent this past year, as every year 1) responding to mail requests for reading materials, and legal materials (from U.S. and Canadian prisoners), 2) participating in various coalitions or networks that organize around prisoner justice, opposing recent trends that emphasize punitiveness and imprisonment, particularly the federal government's tough on crime agenda, 3) working with other groups to organize and participate in Prisoner Justice Day events in August.

No One is Illegal Ottawa

No One is Illegal Ottawa is a group of im/migrants and allies guided by antioppression principles that advocates and fights for the dignity and self determination of all im/migrants regardless of status.

In 2013-2014 we kicked off the Solidarity City campaign to ensure that city and social services in the city are open to all migrants regardless of status. We launched the End Immigration Detention (EIDN) campaign in Ottawa to support the activities of the broader national campaign. The EIDN campaign aims to educate the public around migrant detention and to seek an end to the indefinite detention of migrant families and children.



justicefordeepan.org As an OPIRG- Carleton Working Group, Justice For Deepan continues to support Deepan Budlakoti in his fight to stop his deportation, to have his conditions dropped and to have his Canadian citizenship restored. In 2013-2014, Justice For Deepan accomplished a great deal through our organizing efforts. We have developed a website through which we encourage

individuals and organizations to sign a public support statement, and where we post upcoming events, actions and other relevant news. We maintain a social media presence through Facebook, Twitter as well as a YouTube channel. Justice For Deepan has organized direct actions through which we have sought to demand meaningful action and accountability from various MP's, who in their positions of power can intervene in his case, despite their frequent claims to the contrary. We have organized numerous public education and awareness events about Deepan's case, situating his experience within a larger context of double punishment, systemic racism, criminalization and incarceration – this has included a multi-city tour in January 2014 in Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia. With Justice For Deepan's legal team, we have achieved legal and other victories that have direct implications for Deepan's daily life (some of his Immigration and Refugee Board-imposed conditions have been changed or dropped altogether, and Deepan has obtained a work permit and social insurance number. Throughout our work, we have consciously sought to make connections, to build links and solidarity with other social justice groups and movements in Ottawa and elsewhere, including migrant justice group No One Is Illegal.

The Justice for Deepan support committee was formed in July 2013 to support Deepan Budlakoti in his quest to have his citizenship restored. Justice For Deepan rejects the Canadian state's systematic, racist policy of 'double punishment' in which im/migrants, refugees and those without status are punished twice for the same thing. www.justicefordeepan.org
